- **RFQs:** Attached is some good information on RFQs for professional services. Please review.
- **VA:** I spoke with one of the developers of the VA project. They are working to submit final proposals and we were able to provide additional information to support their application.
- **Pool:** Pool hours will be temporary shifted to 1-6pm starting 6/17 until we are able to get more lifeguards certified.
- **Fiber to the Home:** ImOn Communications met with City staff and they along with HR Green Engineering will be in town engineering a fiber to the home project. Their tentative construction date is April 2025. They seem very knowledgeable and clearly have worked with cities on similar projects.
- **School:** Working on a 28E agreement with the school superintendent for public safety teaching services.
- **SRO:** We are working our way through the COPS grant application process (Chief and Sergeant Melssen). Submitted 6/11/24.
- **Alliant Energy:** All paperwork is in the hands of Alliant, and it will work through their internal process and the IUB for franchise fees.

IT (Newberry)

- This week I have looked at the camera that had went out. It turns out it is the cable. I did not have any UV resistant cable, so I purchased some. It should be here this week I will get it fixed once I get the new cable. That is good news as a new camera is \$2000.00.
- Additionally, I have ordered the video systems for the interview rooms. The PO has been turned into Tara and hopefully will get on the next agenda so that it can be paid out for this fiscal year and that will stop us having to do an amendment next year. We received the quote back from LISCO for the upgraded service. I hope you have looked over it. It is my recommendation that we go ahead and upgrade to 1GB service. Additionally, reviewing the Verizon bill, I have found 4 lines that could be canceled due to very limited use. That should save about 130.00 a month.

Building (Crooks)

Here are my weekly updates:

1. On Friday I completed eight rental inspections at Nexus Development on Layne Dr. This would be for their third building, and they now have 20 units approved to rent.
2. I have reviewed applications and issued six new building permits in the past week. Projects include new roofs, driveway, new fence, and signs
3. Three new nuisance notices have been mailed out, all for tall grass & weeds

26.3 Competitive bids for public improvement contracts.

1. If the estimated total cost of a public improvement exceeds the competitive bid threshold of one hundred thousand dollars, or the adjusted competitive bid threshold established in **section 314.1B**, the governmental entity shall advertise for sealed bids for the proposed public improvement by posting a notice to bidders not less than thirteen and not more than forty-five days before the date for filing bids in a relevant contractor plan room service with statewide circulation, in a relevant construction lead generating service with statewide circulation, and on an internet site sponsored by either a governmental entity or a statewide association that represents the governmental entity. If circumstances beyond the control of the governmental entity cause a scheduled bid letting to be postponed and there are no changes to the project's contract documents, a notice to bidders of the revised date shall be posted not less than four and not more than forty-five days before the revised date for filing bids in a relevant contractor plan room service with statewide circulation, in a relevant construction lead generating service with statewide circulation, and on an internet site sponsored by either a governmental entity or a statewide association that represents the governmental entity.

2. A governmental entity shall have an engineer licensed under **chapter 542B**, a landscape architect licensed under **chapter 544B**, or an architect licensed under **chapter 544A** prepare plans and specifications, and calculate the estimated total cost of a proposed public improvement. A governmental entity shall ensure that a sufficient number of paper copies and, if available, electronic and digital copies of the project's contract documents, including all drawings, plans, specifications, and estimated total costs of the proposed public improvement are made available for distribution at no charge to prospective bidders, subcontractor bidders, suppliers, and plan room services. If a deposit is required as part of a paper contract documents distribution policy by the public owner, the deposit shall not exceed two hundred fifty dollars per set which shall be refunded upon return of the contract documents within fourteen days after award of the project. If the contract documents are not returned in a timely manner and in a reusable condition, the deposit shall be forfeited. The governmental entity shall reimburse the landscape architect, architect, or professional engineer for the actual costs of preparation and distribution of plans and specifications.

3. Sections 26.4 through 26.12 apply to all competitive bidding pursuant to [this section](#).

26.4 Architectural, landscape architectural, and engineering services — exemptions — prohibitions.

1. Architectural, landscape architectural, or engineering design services procured for a public improvement are not subject to [sections 26.3](#) and [26.14](#).
2. Fee-based selection of an architect, landscape architect, or engineer for a public improvement shall be prohibited.

26.14 Competitive quotations for public improvement contracts.

1. Competitive quotations shall be required for a public improvement having an estimated total cost that exceeds the applicable threshold amount provided in [this section](#), but is less than the competitive bid threshold established in [section 26.3](#).

2. Unless the threshold amounts are adjusted pursuant to [section 314.1B](#), the following threshold amounts shall apply:

a. Sixty-seven thousand dollars for a county, including a county hospital.

b. Fifty-one thousand dollars for a city having a population of fifty thousand or more.

c. Fifty-one thousand dollars for a school district having a population of fifty thousand or more.

d. Fifty-one thousand dollars for an aviation authority created within a city having a population of fifty thousand or more.

e. Thirty-six thousand dollars for a city having a population of less than fifty thousand, for a school district having a population of less than fifty thousand, and for any other governmental entity.

f. The threshold amount applied to a city applies to a city hospital.


3. *a.* When a competitive quotation is required, the governmental entity shall make a good faith effort to obtain quotations for the work from at least two contractors regularly engaged in such work prior to letting a contract. Good faith effort shall include advising all contractors who have filed with the governmental entity a request for notice of projects. The governmental entity shall provide such notice in a timely manner so that a requesting contractor will have a reasonable opportunity to submit a competitive quotation. Quotations may be obtained from contractors after the governmental entity provides a description of the work to be performed, including the plans and specifications prepared by an architect, landscape architect, or engineer, if required under [chapter 542B](#), [544B](#), or [544A](#), and an opportunity to inspect the work site. The contractor shall include in the quotation the price for labor, materials, equipment, and supplies required to perform the work. If the work can be performed by an employee or employees of the governmental entity, the governmental entity may file a quotation for the work to be performed in the same manner as a contractor. If the governmental entity receives no quotations after making a good faith effort to obtain quotations from at least two contractors regularly engaged in such work, the governmental entity may negotiate a contract with a contractor regularly engaged in such work.

b. The governmental entity shall designate the time, place, and manner for filing quotations, which may be received by mail, facsimile, or electronic mail. The governmental entity shall award the contract to the contractor submitting the lowest responsive, responsible quotation subject to [section 26.9](#), or the governmental entity may reject all of the quotations. The unconditional acceptance and approval of the lowest responsive, responsible quotation shall constitute the award of a contract. The governmental entity shall record the approved quotation in its meeting minutes. The contractor awarded the contract shall not commence work until the contractor's performance and payment bond has been approved by the governmental entity. A governmental entity may delegate the authority to award a contract, to execute a contract, to authorize work to proceed under a contract, or to approve the contractor's performance and payment bond to an officer or employee of the governmental entity. A quotation approved outside a meeting of the governing body of a governmental entity shall be included in the minutes of the next regular or special meeting of the governing body.

c. If a public improvement may be performed by an employee of the governmental entity, the amount of estimated sales and fuel tax and the premium cost for the performance and payment bond which a contractor identifies in its quotation shall be deducted from the contractor's price for determining the lowest responsive, responsible quotation. If no quotations are received to perform the work, or if the governmental entity's estimated cost to do the work with its employee is less than the lowest responsive, responsible quotation

received, the governmental entity may authorize its employee or employees to perform the work.

Iowa law recognizes that qualifications-based selection (QBS) is a competitive process that matches the right engineering and design professional to your project, based on experience, training, availability and previous experience. Iowa law restricts the selection of an architect, landscape architect, or engineer services based on price.

IOWA LAW (effective July 1, 2022)

26.4 Architectural and engineering services – exemptions – prohibitions.

1. Architectural, landscape architectural, or engineering design services procured for a public improvement are not subject to sections 26.3 and 26.14. (Competitive bidding statutes)
2. Fee-based selection of an architect, landscape architect, or engineer for a public improvement shall be prohibited

The Qualification-Based Selection Process is simple and straightforward

Bidding may get you a price quickly, but that price may not tell you what you bought for years to come. With QBS you'll know what you're getting before the contract is ever signed.

Step 1 - Selection Process

- A. The owner identifies the general scope of work for the project.
- B. The selection time frame for procuring professional design services is established.
- C. A request for statements of qualifications is published

Note: Iowa law allows an owner to begin directly communicating with a engineering firm they are familiar with or have previously utilized without requesting proposals or qualifications from other firms. If the owner chooses to solicit proposals from other firms there is a simple procedure they may choose to follow

- D. Statements of qualifications are received and evaluated.
- E. All firms are informed of their rating and ranking (this is optional).
- F. A short-list of firms to be interviewed (if interviews are necessary) may be determined.
- G. A tour of the site and/or facility may be arranged for the short-listed firms.
- H. Interviews are conducted and the firms ranked, based on their project approach, project team, timetable and overall understanding of the project.
- I. The firm most qualified for the specific project is selected.

Step 2 - Jointly Develop Scope of Project

- J. Negotiations are conducted relative to the project's scope, professional services required, and fee and payment schedules with the top-ranked firm. If an agreement cannot be reached with the top ranked firm, those negotiations are ended and negotiations begun with the second highest ranked firm (however, most negotiations between owners and the highest ranked firm are successful).

Step 3 - Contract Agreement

- K. An agreement covering the understandings reached during negotiations above is executed, and a notice to proceed is issued by the Owner to the successful engineer.
- L. All firms involved receive post-selection communications about the project award.

"It is considered more desirable to make the qualification selection first and then to discuss the price because both parties need to review in detail what is involved in the work (for example, estimates of man-hours, personnel costs, and alternatives that the architect-engineer or land surveyor should consider in depth). once parameters have been fully discussed and understood and the architect-engineer or land surveyor proposes a fee for the work, the recommended procedure requires the Public Owner to make its own evaluation and judgment as to the reasonableness of the fee."
